Job Summary

We seek someone who will make an outstanding contribution to the research profile of the Department and will be able to teach across a wide range of modules.

As a Lecturer, the post holder will create and disseminate knowledge by initiating and conducting original research, publishing in their area of research expertise, and developing and delivering undergraduate and postgraduate programmes.

Main Details

Research:

To pursue sustained research activity through original research and scholarship, including other research-related contributions through conference papers and presentations and/or consultancy projects and advice. This will include:

- Undertaking high quality research in Sociolinguistics through to publication
- Submitting applications to external funders to support research activity
- Project managing research activities, and supervising research staff (where appropriate)
- Developing novel methodologies and techniques appropriate to the type of research being pursued

- Attracting, supervising and examining PhD students, both within the institution and externally
- Providing expert advice to staff and students within the discipline
- Applying knowledge in a way which develops new intellectual understanding

Learning and Teaching:

Using a variety of methods in teaching with individuals and groups of undergraduate and postgraduate students. This will include:

- Teaching and examining modules in Sociolinguistics, and related areas at undergraduate and postgraduate level on campus and via Distance Learning.
- Planning and reviewing teaching approaches and acting as a mentor to encourage others to do the same
- Developing programme and module proposals and making substantial contributions to the design of teaching programmes more widely in the Department or School
- Developing the full range of responsibilities in relation to supervision, marking and examining
- Using appropriate approaches to learning and teaching
- Disseminating appropriate practices through suitable media
- Devising and supervising projects, student dissertations and practical work
- A small amount of this teaching is delivered abroad so there will be some travelling
